A&W advances the U of S global leadership in beef and forage research

SASKATOON - A&W has made a substantial investment in the Canadian beef industry with a \$5-million donation toward the University of Saskatchewan's (U of S) Livestock and Forage Centre of Excellence (LFCE).

The unique centre will foster innovative research, training and outreach to meet the needs of both livestock producers and consumers in Canada, while also helping to sustainably produce food for a growing world population.

The donation will be used to fund the construction of the Livestock and Food Building at the LFCE site near Clavet (\$3 million), create a community outreach and engagement program (\$1 million), and establish a visiting fellowship in One Health research (\$1 million). The new building will be completed in the spring of 2018.

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Saskatchewan Forage Council welcomes new researchers

The 2017 Saskatchewan Advisory Council on Forage Crops (SACFC) meeting was held on November 6th in Saskatoon, SK. This year's meeting provided an overview from Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada (AAFC), Saskatchewan Ministry of Agriculture, Agriculture Research Branch, Beef Cattle Research Council (BCRC), Saskatchewan Forage Network, Saskatchewan Cattlemen's Association (SCA), and the University of Saskatchewan (U of S) on research being conducted, funding program opportunities and investments in forage across Canada over the past few years. An update on the new Livestock and Forage Centre of Excellence (LFCE) was also provided by Dr. Mary Buhr, Dean, College of Agriculture and Bioresources, University of Saskatchewan.

The SACFC meets annually with the mission of uniting representatives from government, industry, producer groups and researchers to share information and to identify and address issues of concern regarding forage production and utilization. It is also an opportunity to introduce new members and discover new research. In this spirit, Saskatchewan Forage Council (SFC) is pleased to welcome researchers Dr. Jillian Bainard, Dr. Jon Bennett, and Dr. Sean Prager and the Post-Doctoral fellow Dr. Michele Simili da Silva.

Dr. Jillian Bainard is a research scientist with AAFC at the Swift Current Research and Development Centre (SCRDC). As a Forage Ecophysiologicalist, Jillian's research involves studying forage crops and the interface between plants and their environment. She works with forage breeders, ecologists, and animal scientists to develop forages that are beneficial nutritionally, environmentally, and economically. Jillian completed her Ph.D. in Botany at the University of Guelph in 2011, followed by a postdoc at SCRDC where she studied the use of annual forage polycultures.

Dr. Sean Prager is an Entomology Assistant Professor in the Plant Sciences Department of the U of S. Dr. Prager's forage related research is primarily focused on clover and other forage seed crops with interest on how to balance pollination services, especially from native pollinators with management of insect pests such as lesser clover leaf weevils. Sean has a Ph.D. in Biological Sciences (Ecology and Evolution) from Brock University in Ontario and postdocs at USDA-ARS and at Texas A&M University.

Dr. Jon Bennett is a Rangeland Ecologist recently hired by the U of S, Plant Sciences Department. Jon's research focuses on understanding the processes that structure grasslands and using that understanding to predict how they will respond to changes in the environment, with an emphasis

on invasion. He has earned a Ph.D. from the University of Alberta, where he studied the factors regulating plant communities in fescue grassland and fellowships at the University of British Columbia and the University of Tartu in Estonia.


Dr. Michele Simili da Silva is a Mitacs Post-Doctoral Fellow in the Department of Animal and Poultry Science at the U of S in partnership with SFC and the Western Beef Development Centre (WBDC), under the supervision of Dr. Bart Lardner. Michele is an Animal Scientist from Brazil with a Master's and Ph.D. in Forage Crops and Pasture. The majority of her studies have been concentrated on analysis and characterization of the effects of species, varieties, mixtures, management and utilization on production and nutritive value of forages. Currently, she is involved in projects focused on the improvement of forage performance on the Canadian Prairies.

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Soil Health in a New Climate

CFGA's 8th annual conference a huge success

The Canadian Forage and Grassland Association (CFGA), in conjunction with the Ontario Forage Council, held its 8th annual conference in Guelph, Ont., Nov. 14 to 16. This year's theme was Next Generation Forage Cropping Systems: Profit Above, Wealth Below to recognize the important role forage and grasslands play in providing both economic and environmental benefits to Canadians from coast to coast.

The conference included a pre-conference tour, an exhibition of businesses and organizations related to forages and grasslands, a full line-up of speakers on such topics as soil carbon storage, forage exports, soil health enhancement and profitable forage systems and virtual farm tours featuring innovative producers across the country.

Leadership award winner

A highlight of the conference was the CFGA awards luncheon when the CFGA announced the winner of its New Holland-sponsored Leadership Award. This year's winner is Bill Thomas from Truro, Nova Scotia. Well-known as a tireless advocate, educator and leader in the Atlantic forage sector, Thomas has 30 years of extension service in Nova Scotia specializing in forage crops and livestock production, adaptive research and leadership working directly with agricultural commodity groups, farmer clients and the public.

The CFGA Leadership Award was established in 2012 to recognize and encourage leadership in the forage and grassland sector. It recognizes individuals, groups or organizations who exemplify or enhance the goals of the CFGA and whose leadership has impact of national and/or international significance.

AGGP update

This year's conference also brought together leading forage and grassland experts from across Canada and North America for a day and a half of technical workshops. Along with presentations related to high performance forages, stakeholders and leading researchers from universities and Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada discussed best management practices and provided a science review on high performance forage and grassland management systems in Canada.

These presentations and workshops were the latest activities for the CFGA's High Performance Management Systems to Reduce Greenhouse Gases in Canada's Forage and Grasslands research and development project that falls under Canada's \$27 million, five-year Agricultural Greenhouse Gases Program (AGGP).

Canadian Bison Association 34th Annual Convention - Centuries of Bison - 150 Years as a Country

About 310 people participated in the different events of the 34th Canadian Bison Association Annual Convention at the Delta Regina on November 19th and 20th, 2017. The theme of the convention "Centuries of Bison - 150 Years as a Country" was in recognition of Canada's 150th birthday while acknowledging that bison have been on the Canadian landscape for centuries. Each person who attended the banquet and awards ceremony received a bison pin inscribed with "150".

In addition to the convention attendees there were 22 participants in the Childrens' Program and 14 young people involved in the Junior Judging Program.

Keynote speaker Gabe Brown from Bismarck North Dakota kept producers glued to their seats for almost three hours as he shared his experiences in improving soil health through regeneration of resources. He shared with the group their ranch's strategies of holistically integrating their grazing and no-till cropping systems which include a wide variety of cash crops, multispecies cover crops combined with all natural grass finished beef and sheep. The Browns also believe that healthy soil leads to healthy plants, animals and people. In sharing the strategies that they use on their farm,

Gabe emphasized that the strategies work for them and that producers may have to modify some of the ideas shared to be effective for their own operations. Thank you to the Saskatchewan Forage Council and the Saskatchewan Bison Association for working together to bring Gabe Brown to the CBA convention as keynote speaker.

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Three tips for swath and bale grazing

Match your cows and your feed, leave a 'snowshoe' if mud is an issue, and make those swaths wide and high.

If you're planning to swath or bale graze cattle this winter, here are three pieces of advice from Agriculture Canada research scientists Vern Baron in Lacombe and John Duynisveld in Nappan, N.S.

Match animal and forage

Successful extended grazing matches the energy requirements of the cow with the true quality of the forage and/or supplement being offered. Knowing the quality of the feed, by reviewing the results after sending samples to a lab for feed analysis, is the first and critical step to a successful winter grazing program.

It takes 20 per cent more energy on average for cows in an extended grazing system than in a drylot system because of the extra energy they use to search for feed and to stay warm. This means cows must be in good condition to be able to face the demands of winter grazing.

Leave some biomass on the field

Be prepared for whatever Mother Nature will throw at you so harsh weather doesn't result in cows losing body condition (and having more calving difficulties, lower calf birth weights, and a longer postpartum interval). One tip is to ensure cows have proper lice control to keep their hair coat healthy and full all winter.

During extreme cold patches, make sure they have enough high-energy feed. This may mean moving fences a little earlier and not making cattle 'clean up' swaths to the same extent you would expect during milder temperatures. Good access to natural or man-made windbreaks is especially important when temperatures drop or winds pick up.

Leave big swaths

Leaving some biomass in the field improves soil organic matter, but generally speaking, the more crop that cattle utilize, the more efficient the extended grazing system.

Overall utilization in extended grazing systems is relatively high - both Baron and Duynisveld have found utilization rates of 65 to 90 per cent in their research trials, with utilization declining in deep snow.

To increase utilization when swath grazing, build large swaths around three to four feet wide and 18 inches high. These big swaths are easier for cows to access even with snow cover. Choosing a type of crop and variety that is higher yielding also helps to increase utilization.
